ABOUT THE PERFORMANCE: Sandy Kiefer: *Talking Cello* Grade levels: preK-3

The Talking Cello brings cello sounds and stories to students. Ms. Kiefer introduces the cello, its history and sounds, while she reads a story and plays.

LEARNING GOALS:

1. To introduce a string instrument.

2. To see how sounds "talk"; how sounds convey emotion and how sounds can be used to create stories.

3. To equate sounds with emotion and action.

PRE-ACTIVITY SUMMARY:

Listen to Yo-Yo Ma's recording of Bach Suites #1. Draw a picture of what each short movement sounds and/or looks like.

POST-ACTIVITY

 LEARNING GOALS: 1) To understand how sounds convey emotion and how sounds can be used to create stories. 2) To develop listening skills. MATERIALS/PREPARATION: Recording example of <i>"Carnival of the Animals"</i> by Saint-Saens, CD/Tape Player, Drawing papers, Color pencils, Marker pens 	 STEP 1: Play "Carnival of the Animals" by Camille Saint-Saens. STEP 2: Discuss the music with your students. -Did you like it? -What did you/didn't you like it? -How did it make you feel? ; does it make you sad, happy, or excited? -Can you think of some characters; animals or persons, which describe the music? STEP 3: Ask students to write a story and/or draw some-
TIME: 45 Minutes TIPS FOR THE TEACHER: *Camille Saint-Saens's <i>Carnival of the Animals</i> is a set of orchestral character pieces, each of which is meant to describe a partic- ular animal, usually by mimicking the sounds it makes or characterizing the way it moves or carries itself.	thing that portrays the music. STEP 4: Share the stories or drawings with students.

EXTENSIONS:

Play *"Carnival of the Animals"* and then ask students to move their body freely in a way that expresses the animals in the piece.



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VOCABULARY:

suite: a suite is an organized set of instrumental or orchestral pieces normally performed at a single sitting. (Handel wrote 22 keyboard suites, while Bach produced multiple suites for cello, violin, flute, and other instruments, as well as his English suites, French suites and Partitas for keyboard.)
